Dear Cousins:

On May 25, 1670 William Pennoyer, citizen and clothworker of London, among many other provisions left by his Last Will and Testament out of the profits from his lands in the County of Norfolk ten pounds per annum paid forever to the Corporation for Propogation of the Gospel in New England to educate two fellows and two scholars in the college called Cambridge College (now known as Harvard College), one of them to be of the posterity of Robert Pennoyer. Robert's daughter, Elizabeth, on August 1, 1670 married Richard Lounsberry, the common ancestor of most with that surname who have spread out over nearly every state and many Canadian provinces.

The Pennoyer Scholarship Fund is small and little used. As a recipient of that scholarship in 1948, I view the fund with a special interest. If the Lounsberry descendants could take as much pride in contributing to the fund as in receiving the scholarship at Haryard, think of the magnificence and prestige that scholarship would achieve. The larger the fund, the larger the scholarship and the more opportunity our children will have to participate. There are hundreds who could qualify.

I recently received a copy of your first Newsletter published Fall of 1982. It was sent to Harold Lounsbury, 9539 Hallery Md., New Hartford, N.Y., who gave me a copy.

I have been searching for our Lounsbury family for some time now, My Great-Grandsother was almira Lounsbury who was born in Paris Township, Ossida Co., New York in 1825. She was theoldest of several children born to Thomas C. Lonsbury and his wife, Besteey Assay(?). A death record mentions that both parents were from Connecticut. Prom Consus records: Thomas and family are found in Paris, M.Y. in 1830 and 1840. He is not listed in the 1820 for that area. In 1850, Thomas is missing, presumed deceased. From these records. Thomas C. as born about 1790, and his wife also. Of this which, there was only one surviving male, George N., who would be Marchi Lounsbury's monoster. George E. Lounsbury's descendants all remained in the New Martiford area.

If you have any information or thoughts on the family of Thomas C., born 1790, Ct., I would appreciate hearing from you. I would like to receive your Membeletter, I found it very interesting. The day I made contact with Marcid, when latter, I found it very interesting for all of we.
