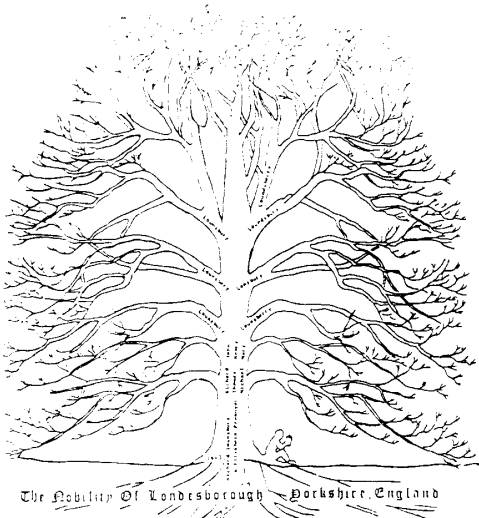


# THE LOUNSBURY TREE

In answer to Query from Newsletter #9:

I am descended from John Lounsbury and Sarah through Charity Lounsbury Sloat. Family tradition has it that Sarah's maiden name was Letson, but I cannot document that. I believe John came to Schoharie (Albany) county in the 1790's from Dutchess county. Probably the Fredricksburg patent which is now within the boundaries of Putnam County. There were two families--that of Michael Sloat and Isaac Lounsbury who shared a lot near Red Mills. I believe the marriage of Charity Lounsbury and Henry Sloat came about because the families were neighbors, but again, I am only speculating.

Could you please direct me to someone who also might be interested in this line?

I understand you are the Editor of the Lounsbury Tree, and that I can obtain a copy of the newsletter by sending you a SASE.

I am researching the line of Charity Lounsbury who married Henry Sloat (Will-Schoharie N.Y. 1824). She was the daughter of John Lounsbury B. 1731 and Sarah Letson B. 1729. John served in the Rev. war, but died 1811 before pension applications. We don't know anything of his parentage, although I suspect he came from Dutchess county and was related to Isaac Lounsbury there.

If there is some way to coordinate research with others who might be working on the same lines through your newsletter, would you please advise me as to how this may be done.

I have been in touch with Col. Harold Richard Hennessy, MD.(Ret.) and his wife, Helen Adele Lounsberry Hennessy, with whom we had lost contact for a couple of years. Martha (Mrs C.H.) Lounsberry sent the address for which we are grateful.

Helen Adele's lineage chart appears at the right. That is the kind of a chart or record that we all probably wish we had completed. It appears here to illustrate the style, completeness, and certainly the interest it creates. Helen and her family have done extensive research, much of which has been published. She has also contributed information for previous issues of The Lounsbury Tree. We hope the information which appears in this issue may help others to update any records they may have. It may also help to establish connections to other readers' families.

From approximately this spot on July 5, 1876 Colonel Clement A. Lounsberry, the Founder of the Bismark Tribune in a feat of newspaper enterprise that overcame many obstacles flashed by telegraph to the New York Herald the first account of General Custer's defeat and death at the Little Big Ho: Few news stories have so electrified a nation.

space to share all of it herein. However, here are some highlights. The family of Colonel Clement Augustus Lounsberry appears on this page at the right. You will note that he is an ancestor of Helen Adele's.

Helen was cited in Foremost Women of the Twentieth Century. The biographical data included her many accomplishments: managing a printing business in Duluth, MN.; writing publications including eight hard-cover family genealogical books which are on file with the Minnesota Historical Society, St. Paul. Also, membership in numerous societies, recipient of numerous awards, most recently the "Colonial Order of the Crown", and the Plantagenet Society. Other information about Helen Adele appears on page 217 of Foremost Women of the Twentieth Century, published by International Biographical Centre, Cambridge, England, 1988.

Harold and Helen were both recognized in the September 1988 Active Link, a publication in the retirement community where they live. They deserve such recognition and have reason to celebrate. They have four children, 13 grandchildren, 2 great grandchildren, 50th wedding anniversary in 1980 with the 60th coming up this year on July 24. Both are very interested in genealogy (Harold caught the hobby/bug from Helen Adele) and have co-authored nine family history-heritage books. They have four in their extended family with PhDs. Harold was recognized in The Standard Bearer, a newsletter of the Retired Officers Association.

Congratulations Dr. Harold Richard and Helen Adele from all the other Ls.

The Hennessey's sent a copy of the certificate "Dakota Territory Pioneer", indicating that Helen Adele is a direct descendant of Col. Clement Augustus Lounsberry who was living in Dakota Territory in 1889 or earlier. They also sent an interesting chart concerning Genera-

Their children were: (1) Hattie Agnes (1866-1950); (2) George Harlow (1868-1955); (3) Wells (1870-1917); (4) Fred Hoskins (1873-1929); (5) William Clement (1875-1954). No. 4, Fred Hoskins, became the father of Helen Adele Lounsberry. He was born in Minneapolis, Minn.

Clement A. Lounsberry, son of Rufus Rodman Lounsberry, was born in (area of Newville) Wilmington township, De Kalb County Indiana. He and Lucretia V. Hoskins (born in Fayette N.Y.) were married at her home in Marengo, Mich. After the civil war, the gallant soldier (last commander of the 20th Mich Vol Inf.) and his wife traveled to Minnesota and later North Dakota. He became a well known journalist. Founder of the respected BISMARCK TRIBUNE (1873), he breathed a mighty gusto into his era. His famous scoop of the Custer massacre (July 1876) electrified the nation. He is best described as a soldier, writer, journalist, newspaper owner and publisher, community leader, lawyer, politician and trusted public servant. This extraordinary man led a long and colorful life. His EARLY HISTORY OF NORTH DAKOTA --- published in 1919, is still a standard reference book. He is buried in Arlington National Cemetery (grave 1133 Sect 2).

With vigor, enthusiasm and sometimes "missionary zeal", the Colonel and his daughter Hattie (Mrs. C.E.V. Draper) and later her two daughters, Olivia and Elizabeth did much to collect family data. As a result, there is now a "wealth of information" in possession of Helen (Lounsberry) Hennessey. Their efforts were indeed praiseworthy. Much data (in print) may be found at the Minnesota Historical Society (library) 600 Cedar St., St. Paul, Minn. 55101 Ref. Library, first floor. Data must be read at the Library. (near State Capitol Building) Look under the names of Lounsberry & Hennessey in card index

tion Number and Bloodline from Henry Samson who was a passenger on the Mayflower voyage which terminated at Plymouth, New England, December 1620. The chart is for Patricia Anne Hennessey Francis, granddaughter of Harold and Helen. The line goes back to Henry Samson at the time when Michael Lounsberry married Abigail Hillman, daughter of Seth Hillman, son of Susanna Samson, daughter of James Samson who was the son of Henry Samson (ancestor). Henry's wife was Ann Plummer. Susanna's husband was Benjamin Hillman. James Samson's wife was Hanna (Waite). Patricia's parents are Harold R. Hennessey Jr. and Brenda J. Crandall "Debbie." Her husband is Kirk Steven Francis. They were married on August 26, 1989.

I don't know how much Harold and Helen are able and willing to share in regard to the format or style of presenting their family history, but, what they have sent, some of which appears in this issue, is

#### Family Group Form

Speaking of family lines, enclosed with this issue of the newsletter is a Family Group Form sent by Lucretia Arthur in California. It has been modified somewhat with some instructions for completion. For all those who care to complete a form for yourself and other L ancestors and descendants (the form may be photocopied), please follow these instructions; some appear on the edge of the form.

1. Please print or type all information.

2. The abbreviations on the form which may not be clear to everyone are: Chr.--Christened or baptized; Marr.--Married; Bur.--Buried.

3. Dates: Enter as Day-- Month-- Full Year.

4. Names: Use full names, keeping surnames (last name) in capitals; maiden name (in capitals)

5. Place: Town/Village/City in the first column; County in the 2nd; State/Province in the 3rd, and Country in the last.

6. Any "Other Marriage" information which will not fit under the Husband or Wife (line 7) may be entered in the space at the bottom right of the form.

7. Please list your sources, (public records, family Bible, certificates, church records, gravestones, family notes, etc.) at the bottom of the form.

8. Use the back of the form for any additional information or to clarify any entry.

9. Return the form to Albert Lounsbury, 212 Nelson Avenue, Saratoga Springs, NY 12866.

**From the mailbag ----**

Mildred L. D'Ambrosio, 25 Pleasant Street, North Reading, MA 01864, sent a photocopied picture of the Lounsbury Bicentennial Reunion (1783-1983), held in Petitcodiac, NB, Canada in 1983. It would not be clear enough to reproduce it for the newsletter. There looks to be well over 100 people in the picture and all are identified. They are all descendants of William<sup>5</sup> and Grace Gray who settled there in 1873 and "started a burgeoning Lounsbury population," as stated by Mildred. Perhaps some of our readers attended that reunion. Anyone interested may be able to obtain a copy from Mildred.

Other highlights from her letter: She has tracked down and photographed all the gravestones of direct Lounsbury ancestors in that area... She has grave rubbings of Canadian ancestors' stones and, also, those buried in New England... She has little information on the New York families. She asks, "Is it possible that the gravestones of Richard<sup>1</sup> and Elizabeth John<sup>2</sup> and Ann, Michael<sup>3</sup> and Abigail, William<sup>4</sup> and Sarah, have gravestones still standing? In New York? Besides their beautiful rubbings, they are further corroboration of the information I already have. 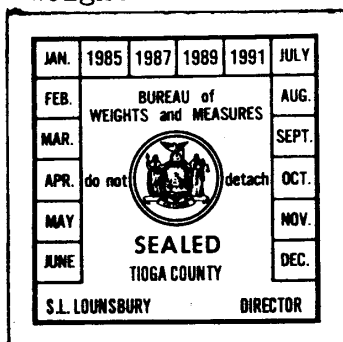

I wrote earlier telling you about a town and post office by the name of Lounsbury, South Dakota. I ordered the records from the National Archives in Washington, DC. I am sending you a few copies of the main papers.

Thomas S. Johnson made application for a post office to be called, Lounsbury, South Dakota on 3 June 1884. The post office of Lounsbury, South Dakota was established on 31 July 1884 with Thomas S. Johnson as postmaster. Being located on the county line it was first considered to be in Clark County and later as being in Day County, South Dakota. Thomas Johnson remained post master until 30 November 1891 when Peder J. Markrud became the postmaster. County lines were still a factor and on 28 February 1896 Lounsbury, South Dakota was considered to be located in Codington County. On 5 June 1906, postmaster--Peder J. Markrud made application to move the post office 4½ miles south east to a location along the new railroad that had been established. He requested the name be LOUNSBERRY but a small settlement was already established there by the name Wallace. His request to move the post office was granted but not the name. The name of the post office was changed to Wallace, South Dakota on 12 February 1907 with Peder Markrud remaining as postmaster. The Wallace post office is still in existence today.

## STEPHEN BELLA AND HARRIET LOUNSBURY

Stephen Bella Lonsbury was born the son of Stephen and Hannah Sperry Lonsbury on 18 November 1780 in Connecticut. Stephen Bella did not like "Lonsbury" because of the connotations related to "bury" and he didn't like "berry" because it implied an edible fruit so he changed his name to Lonsberry. He married Harriet Post, daughter of George and Flora Hill Post, on 28 September 1802. Stephen Bella was believed to have served in the War of 1812 although it has not been proven as of yet. Stephen and Harriet lived in the Courtland and Thompson County areas of New York. Stephen and Harriet's daughter, Oriana Chapin and her family had left New York in 1853 and settled in Jones County, Iowa. Oriana Chapin was well known for smoking a clay pipe. Oriana's husband died in 1854. In the 1860 census, Harriet and her son, Stephen, are living with Oriana and her children near the town of Fairview in Jones County, Iowa. Her son, Henry Post and his family live near by. It is believed they came out together in 1856. No sign of Stephen Bella. He was thought to be yet alive until 1864 but perhaps his death date is incorrect. Harriet died in 1870. Harriet and her son, Stephen, are buried in the church cemetery of the Linn Grove Presbyterian Church near Martelle, Iowa but no records of any kind on any Lonsberry are to be found in the church records. Children born to this union were: Newton (1803- ), Stephen (1805-1885), Irene (1806- ), Henrietta (1813- ), Oriana (1815-1901), and Henry Post (1818-1904).

## HENRY POST AND SUSAN LOUNSBURY

Henry Post Lonsberry was born at Dryden, Thompson County, New York on 13 March 1818. He is believed to have had two wives. He was thought to be living in Virginia with at least one of the wives. No children by either marriage. Both believed to have died. He drove a stagecoach in Maryland. On 26 September 1849 he married Susan M. Horton (wife #3) in Barton, Tioga County, New York. Shortly after they married they came west sojourning in Michigan for a while where their first son, Gilbert was born. (Gilbert's death certificate says he was born in New York). It is also believed they may not have headed west until 1856 or at least arrived in Iowa in 1856. By 1856 they were found in Iowa between Viola and Fairview (Linn and Jones Counties). It is believed Henry's mother, Harriet, and brother, Stephen, may have made the trip with them. The 1860 census has Harriet and Stephen living with Henry's sister, Oriana Chapin. Oriana's husband had died in 1854. Not known where Henry's father, Stephen Bella, was as he was supposed to be yet living until 1864. Between 1866 and 1870 Henry and Susan bought and sold several parcels of land in Viola, Linn County, Iowa. Harriet died in 1870. Within a few months after her death (August 1871), Henry and Susan came by covered wagon to Dakota Territory settling in Clay County. The land was still wild and unsettled. He homesteaded (1876) near Wakonda for a short time then moved to Vermillion setting up a harness and saddle shop business. He retired in 1883 due to poor health (he took the death of his wife very hard). Susan died March 19, 1883 and Henry died 29 December 1904. Both are buried at Bluff View Cemetery, Vermillion, South Dakota (no stones). Children born to this union were: Gilbert Horton (1852-1918), Louisa (1857-1858), Grove Newton (1859-1947), and Henry Jay (1866-1920).

# Study Favors Use of Team Teaching for Off-Neglected Sixth-Graders

Sixth-grade is a crucial, transitional year in any child's education, and team teaching appears to be the most effective way to help these off-neglected students, according to a national study released Sunday in Anaheim.

The study, done for the National Assn. of Secondary Schools, was released at the group's national conference, which involved observation of 132 sixth-graders in 10 schools.

The structure of sixth-grade teaching across the nation—from a single teacher to team teaching—varies in various subjects—the study found. Sixth-graders benefit most from a team of two to five teachers.

There are, in fact, three [types of] sixth grades, each identifiable and fairly distinct," Lounsbury said in the report.

"The first is the traditional sixth grade, self-contained and elementary in nature and form. It is a single class group instructed in all or almost all the basic subjects and skills by one teacher. . . . The second is a middle-level school, which may make curricular options greater, but also produces stress for younger students and lead to the anonymity that plagues contemporary education," their report said.

"The study repeatedly noted that sixth-graders are undergoing rapid physical and emotional growth and that these must be taken into consideration by their teachers.

Too many sixth-grade classes require students to sit too long, even though children at that age are naturally restless, the study found.

"The growing bodies of 11-year-olds call for more opportunities for physical movement than schools presently provide," the report said.

A major value in such teaming among teachers, according to the two educators, is that students can feel less "lost" in moving from one subject matter to another during the school day.

"Middle-level schools tend to be fairly large, which may make curricular options greater, but also produce stress for younger students and lead to the anonymity that plagues contemporary education," their report said.

"The study repeatedly noted that sixth-graders are undergoing rapid physical and emotional growth and that these must be taken into consideration by their teachers.

the departmentalized sixth grade. . . . A student group moves from class to class to receive instruction from different specialist teachers.

"The third [type of] sixth grade is the evolving sixth grade, the teamed sixth grade. Here instruction in the basic subjects is provided by a team of two to five teachers each with some subject area expertise but who can and may plan the total instructional program cooperatively."

Lounsbury and J. Howard Johnston, University of Cincinnati education professor and co-author of the study, said at a news conference that "team teaching" usually doesn't mean hiring more teachers.

"The class-size ratio remains the same," said Johnston, adding that the team concept simply means that the teacher of math, for instance, coordinates with the teacher of English for the same sixth-grade group.

A major value in such teaming among teachers, according to the two educators, is that students can feel less "lost" in moving from one subject matter to another during the school day.

"Middle-level schools tend to be fairly large, which may make curricular options greater, but also produce stress for younger students and lead to the anonymity that plagues contemporary education," their report said.

"The study repeatedly noted that sixth-graders are undergoing rapid physical and emotional growth and that these must be taken into consideration by their teachers.

Too many sixth-grade classes require students to sit too long, even though children at that age are naturally restless, the study found.

"The growing bodies of 11-year-olds call for more opportunities for physical movement than schools presently provide," the report said.
