Until now only circumstantial evidence indicated the family of Charlotte's dad. Cousin Mary has located documentary evidence, an 1866 deed, that proves the link of our Charlotte's dad, Abraham Lockwood, as the son of John Lockwood and Bethsheba Maibee, daughter of Abraham Maibee of Yorktown, NY. This deed lists the names of Abraham Lockwood's children including Charlotte Hays and a son named Zabud Lockwood.

Cousin Mary also discovered an 1835 deed that links Abraham Lockwood with Zabud Lounsbury. Zabud and Abraham jointly purchased the land next to Zabud's house on Highland Road in Peekskill.

Zabud Lockwood may have been named after the Zabud Lounsbury. It is reasonable that Abraham and Maria would name a son after a maternal grandfather who helped them buy property. It is possible that Zabud Lounsbury may be the father of Abraham Lockwood's wife, Maria Lounsbury, and grandfather of my Charlotte. These two deeds provide the only clues found to Maria's possible parentage.

Zabud Lounsbury's ancestry is [available on the web] at <http://home.att.net/~jg245lounsbry.htm#zabud>. This information, which had become lost to us, is now re-discovered. I don't want it to be lost again, so I want

to provide each of you with an opportunity to get copies of every document for yourself, your children, and your grandchildren. Rather than Xerox & snail mail or clog your e-mail boxes with huge downloads, I have temporarily placed images of all the documents and transcriptions of documents on-line at <http://home.att.net/~susgod/charlotte/>. Family Lines

Over the time that I have been publishing the Tree, I have received a few requests for information about an Allen Lounsbery, who was born in New York state on 27 October 1800 and moved to, and was married in, Michigan. I recently received a fairly urgent request from Martha Matthews of Yakima, WA requesting quick turnaround of her request for Allen's ancestors. Her husband is descended from Allen, and while trying to find information about his line she came across several other people searching for the same information.

One of those people is Vola Lounsbury Hutson, from whom I received I received a wonderful letter. Following is an excerpt describing some of Alan's history.

Genealogy is not fatal – but it is a grave disease!

Dear Jim,

I cannot begin to tell you how pleased and excited I was to receive your letter and all of the material you sent me this week.

My father Fred Charles Lounsbury and I have been trying to find the family of Allen Lounsbery since I was about eighteen years old. (He had tried for years before that) He was ten years old when his grandfather (Allen) died so he did not get much information from him. He did tell him stories about his family back in New York. Ever since then, my father and I have tried to trace his family, but never could put the exact finger on it. Your material that you sent me this week does sound like we're on the right track. It is so interesting – I have read it and reread it with such pleasure. Thank you!

Allen came to Michigan in the 1830's. He was a driver of a circus wagon (loved horses). It was his job to use a sling shot to spur a slow horse on. He also drove a stage coach route from Detroit to Lansing about 1839. He was not a religious man, but he married Laura Mathers (who came from Mendon, New York). She was a minister's daughter. They had eight children – the eldest, Charles Henry Lounsbery born Sept. 25 1839, died Feb. 9, 1919, was my grandfather.

I have the entire line of the Lounsberys (of Allen). There were 8 children. Grandpa Charles was the eldest, Clark (killed in Battle of Shiloh), Maryette, John, Emily (Emma), Allen DeWitt, Ira Eugene, and Albert. My grandfather Charles and his sister Maryette had a double wedding Feb. 22, 1866 with another brother and sister (Loraine Latson (my grandmother) and Edward Eugene Latson. So you see, my family was a bit mixed up (but a wonderful family).

I have my grandfather Charles' war records. He was also in the battle of Shiloh and when the war was over, he and another man walked all the way from Shiloh back to Michigan (no transportation in those days).

[...]

My mother used to write to Lillian Wright who lived in Rochester (I think) who was apparently a relative of Allen Sr. This could be a clue. I know nothing more about them. Allen Sr. could not read nor write, so Mather wrote for him but somehow we slipped up and didn't know the exact relationship.

I was so surprised and pleased to hear from Martha Matthews about 2 months ago. I knew of her mother-in-law's family but had lost track of that branch of the family.

I will be happy to help you in any other information you might like.
